### Activity Title **Family Farm Safety – SPOT ‘the hazard’**

### Phases of development

#### Early childhood (Years two - three)

### Activity resources required

Set of **Family farm safety** activity sheets - designed to be used over **two lessons**. Use activity sheets 1, 2 and 3 .first, in conjunction with the brochure for parents. Teachers may then choose any of the other activity sheets to complement and reinforce the farm safety message.

## Procedure

- 1) With teacher direction, the children discuss some of the characteristics of hazards found on farms, considering associated risks. See teacher's notes pages 9, 11 and 15 and the parent brochure for relevant hazard information. Hand out the parent brochure to students at the beginning of the lesson.
- 2) With teacher assistance, children work in groups to complete the .first column of the "Spot the hazard" worksheets. Children take home the brochure for parents and the activity sheets and ask their parents to help them complete the next two columns.  
*It is intended that as well as raising student awareness of these farm hazards, their parents are involved and made aware of these hazards by reading the brochure containing the notes to parents and helping the children complete the activity sheets at home.*
- 3) Children Report Back to Class

## Community Links

How could the school involve the local community in Safety in Schools Week?

*Ask a member of the farming community to speak on:*

*'Safe Play Areas for children on farms' and/or other safety issues around the farm*

**These materials were developed by the WorkSafe Division of the Department of Consumer and Employment Protection to help educate rural children about some of the most common hazards on farms.**

*Around 600 children are admitted to hospital and about 30 children die each year as a result of accidents on Australian farms. Twenty percent of these fatalities involve children under 15. For children under four, the key cause of death is drowning in dams, creeks, rivers or tanks. For children aged between five and fifteen, these tragedies usually involve ATV's or farm bikes, tractors, other farm machinery or horses. Using the Family Farm Safety Kit in your school will help reduce the likelihood of such accidents and injuries to children who live on farms in your community.*
