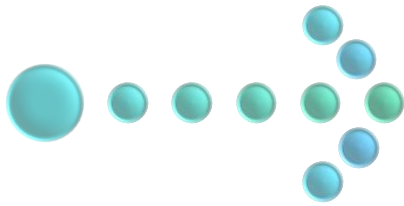

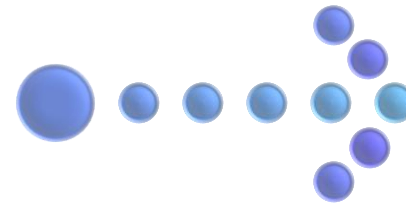

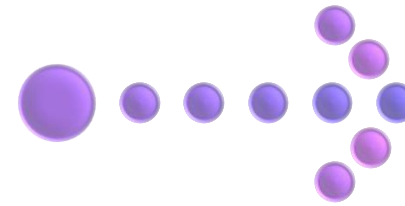

A BRIEF KIDSAFE HISTORY

\$1m for child accident fund

The Government will allocate \$1 million to help set up the Child Accident Prevention Foundation of Australia.

The Prime Minister, Mr Fraser, said in a statement issued in Canberra yesterday that the allocation would be a "specific measure" of support at the launching of the International Year of the Child.

The foundation is a trust being set up by surgeons, businessmen and community leaders to help co-ordinate research into child accidents and their prevention and to educate the community on child-accident prevention.

"I believe such a foundation can do a great deal to focus national attention on our alarmingly high rate of child accidents, with their high costs in human and financial terms", Mr Fraser said.

The \$1 million would be allocated on the understanding that the first \$500,000 would be paid immediately and the second \$500,000 later, and subject to the foundation gaining State Government support.

The International Year of the Child would direct attention throughout the world to the needs and problems of children, their welfare and their opportunities.

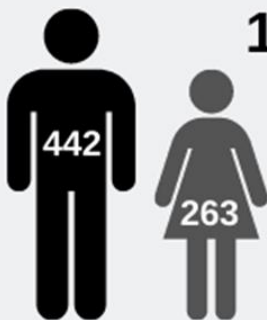
